History

I think the time is about right to start reporting the history leading up to our move from our original lodge at Wilson's Valley to our present building at Perisher. I propose to do this in a series of instalments in the Newsletters. History is made up of facts and opinions, for example, Whitlam and Kerr have both reported that Kerr dismissed Whitlam in 1974, but their reporting of events leading up to the dismissal look very different. For this reason, I invite all members to give me articles or comments to include in our history record (not about Whitlam and Kerr please). This could include a different perspective on an event I have reported or an interesting anecdote.

I have previously covered the start of our first lodge at Wilson's Valley. A copy of that report is at our present lodge. When we took over the Wilson's Valley Lodge in 1971, it was subject to a 20 year lease by the Port Kembla Ski Club Ltd. with the National Parks which expired in 1981, but the club had an option to extend the lease for 10 more years to 1991.

In 1976, the National Parks staff started hinting that our lodge did not really meet the standards they required and in 1977 tentative plans were developed to extend the lodge, but then in 1978 the National Parks started suggesting they did not really want our lodge to remain at Wilson's Valley and if we extended our lease to 1991, there might be no extension beyond that year. We dropped plans to extend the existing lodge.

In 1979 we started reviewing the range of alternatives available such as building in Jindabyne or buying a lodge in Perisher or Thredbo. (An interesting item in this research showed that Thirroul Ski Club purchased Maranatha in 1971 for \$35,000). We had been building up our cash reserves at the rate of about \$2000 per year but recognised we did not yet have the funds to build or buy, so we eventually settled on a plan to build up our funds to 1991 so we could act then as required. Mike Salon became our President in 1979 so he led the club during the developments from then on.

By the AGM in March 1981 we had developed a proposal in principle which was approved by members, to limit membership to 100 full members who would be required to purchase a debenture for about \$1000 either in one payment

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or over 10 years. The goal at this time was to build or buy about 1990. At this time the committee* included Mike Salon. Chris Townend, Warwick Kelly, John Dengate, Peter Gracie. Chris Brandis. Keith Chapmen. Friedl Bartsch, Noel Arnold, Ted Fairbrother, Jose Chicaro, Ron Fitzgerald, Kaye Mulligan, Robert McCulloch, Ron Pinfold.

In May 1981, at a Dinner function involving the National Parks, Mike Salon heard that a small number of lodges (such as CSIRO, Technology, Cooma and Illabunda),' would be required to move from isolated positions into close proximity to other lodges in Perisher by 1984. This was later confirmed and caused a major change in our planning. I will continue with this in the next newsletter.

Annual General Meeting

45 persons attended the AGM on the 21/3/97. The following items were extracted from the minutes.

Presidents Report

President Simon advised that the committee spent some time focusing on what the future direction of the club should be. One of the key objectives of the committee must be to develop and maintain a club identity, a sense of camaraderie. In the past this has been inherent because original members came from a common background - they all worked at Lysaghts. At a later stage, the significant job of building a lodge helped bond people together. Working side by side with people for day after day under difficult and unfamiliar conditions can do wonders for developing long term relationships.

Over recent years, the links with Lysaghts have diminished. Most of our new members do not work at "Lysaghts". Lysaghts as an identity also does not exist, so it is often impossible to differentiate between a Lysaght employee and a BHP employee.

The committee has therefore developed a couple of strategies to try and build on the current club identity, and ensure its ongoing development.

First, based on feedback gleaned from members, we are attempting to increase family participation, without encountering the problems which other clubs have experienced by increasing their full membership numbers. We believe that by increasing family participation, we will keep hold of children of members as they grow up who will have developed bonds between themselves.

To do this, we restructured accommodation rates last year to provide a better rate for adult children of members, and a markedly better rate for nominated ordinary members (which are often spouses).

Secondly, we have markedly increased the budget over the last 2 years for skiing development, which Graeme Williams will talk about in his report. This is a direct requirement of our Memorandums and Articles of Association which state we should "Develop and promote snow sports". Through monetary inducements, we are actively encouraging participation in Interclub Racing in both the adult and junior ranks. The aim is to develop our juniors so they continue to represent the club as adults and therefore help reinforce our club identity / camaraderie.

We also believe that as well as our racers, we should be developing / promoting snow sport for <u>all</u> of our members. Again we have provided financial incentives to all members to develop and improve their skiing.

With the new lease finally in our hands, the committee has to ensure that the lodge facilities (which are now 11 years old) are maintained in such a condition that they will at least see us through to 2025.

One area where we have had to pay increasing maintenance costs is the kitchen. At the time the lodge was built, we could only afford to install a domestic kitchen. The only nondomestic items in the kitchen are the dishwasher (which is not the original) and the gas stove. As a result we have replaced the oven, and the current cupboards are starting to fail. Other shortfalls are the distributed cold storage - ie. a fridge & freezer in the kitchen, a chest freezer in the dry store, another fridge in the foyer, and a coolroom downstairs! Not what you'd call optimal! Also, very limited bench space at a time when we are specifying that our managers do their own pastry and cake making.

We have therefore worked with a commercial kitchen designer, as well as past and new managers to develop initial designs of a new commercial standard kitchen. Ross Livermore and Ron Fitzgerald have worked hard during the summer to complete the shell of the first level of the lodge extension to house the extended kitchen.

Side benefits of the extension will be:

- Increased drying room area with segregated areas for boots & other clothing.
- Increased storage area which could lead to void being used solely for ski equipment and don't we need that!
- Double sided cupboards between kitchen and dining room to enable current cupboards and bench in dining room to be removed (and hence improve access around tables). This should also enable a recessed hot water supply to be installed to replace the urn.

Treasurers Report

Treasurer John Henry advised that the overall performance of the Club this year was satisfactory. A surplus on trading of \$1505 was less than budget while the loss after depreciation and amortisation of \$6758 was less than the budget loss of \$12000.

The cost of catering supplies purchased by the managers this year was unfavourable and disappointing. Purchases were \$5300 unfavourable to budget (21% increase) and \$6500 higher than 1995.

The control process and accountability procedures have been reviewed and a structure tying budget catering costs to the Managers salaries instigated for 1997.

Captains Report

The club captain, Graeme Williams advised the new training program was able to be run with 12 juniors participating on a light cover. The instruction and training was very valuable and ir juniors all recognised and enjoyed the need

r skill improvement.

The Junior Interclub was cancelled due to snow depth but we were able to run the Junior Championships on patches of snow above the sundeck.

Our Downhill Champions were Justin Tierney and Renee Bartsch.

Our X-Country Champions were Justin Tierney and Renee Bartsch.

The under 12's was a clean sweep for Ben Zeller, and the Junior Club Champion was Justin Tierney, Clubperson Renee Bartsch and the Encouragement Award was won by Ben Zeller. The Junior Interclub was rerun later in the season and our strongest team could not compete. On the tricky downhill at Smiggins our small team managed to make a new course and also flew through the air without ski's.

The feedback from all juniors and families involved in the racing and training was very positive and an encouragement to continue more of the same.

Senior club racing had more success with the snow, with our Cross Country Team winning the Interclubs. In the Combined Interclubs we were placed third due to our downhill performance and depth.

X-Country Champion was Friedl Bartsch, Downhill Champion was Ben Salon, and Club Champion was Ben Salon.

One area where we have had to pay increasing maintenance costs is the kitchen. At the time the lodge was built, we could only afford to some strenuous instruction.

The first year of the program didn't pull out the ex-junior skiers, now adults, but from the enquiries and enthusiasm from 1996. 1997 is looking to be more popular.

An excited team was again entered in the Perisher Cup which is a unique and very difficult competition. The team was placed 8th overall.

Our Veteran X-Country Champions are again Noel and Betty Arnold who have again requested assistance and some one else to take over the realm.

Outside club racing two good performers in X-Country in 1996 were Lucas Molloy and Friedl Bartsch who both had consistently high placings in all their races. Well done.

1996 was not a year of outstanding race successes but from all involved in the training and racing it was a success in encouraging and improving everyone's skiing skill levels and club spirit.

G. Williams invited questions. and N. Arnold raised the following issues:

In the past out major goal was minimum cost for all members. Our club policy was that members who are interested only in recreational skiing should not be required to contribute substantially to the cost of members who are interested in racing.

This policy has changed and I suggest members views should be sought on this change.

There has been a huge 26% increase in the cash cost of running our lodge over the past 2 years (excluding the \$7500 interest to members in '94 and '95), as follows:
