## Oh to be in England now that spring is here!

It happened the Thursday before Easter. After weeks of English drizzle, large areas of already soggy central England received a "tropical strength" downpour. It only lasted for a few hours but this was enough to build up floodwater all across the countryside. Fields became reservoirs of brown water and usually placid streams and rivers overflowed their banks, spreading far and wide. Towns and villages which had never seen floodwater were inundated within minutes. Roads, swelled with early Easter traffic, became lakes interspersed with

Keith Chapman blundered into this desperate situation after days of meandering down admittedly damp but otherwise peaceful country roads. With a sneer at pommie motorists who just don't understand flooded roads, the resourceful Aussie driver immediately left the main road and proceeded to explore country lanes. After an hour of terrifying water crossings and repeated U-turns on narrow lanes between high hedges (when some elegantly dressed Englishmen with their trousers rolled up way above the knee were observed pushing their car out of the water) a somewhat less confident motorist rejoined the main road and decided a wider detour was indicated

Many frustrating hours later and back almost at the starting point, a long but luckily successful search was undertaken for some accommodation to get warm and wait out the floods. The next day the roads were again navigable but the scores of cars parked unattended in pools of

floodwater or up to their windows in ditches were a grim reminder of the folly of trying to drive through floods - even for daring Australians

We accept that flash floods happen in Australia but they were incomprehensible in England. The TV and newspaper photos of men in boats rescuing people from upper stories of cottages and from trees were curiously familiar to us tourists but the effects of the floodwater were a disaster for the many locals who found water flowing through their houses for the first time in memory.

# Membership Waiting List Re-Opened.

Our membership waiting list was re-opened in May 98 after being closed in December 97.

You may recall that the way our waiting list works is that our Registrar, Mike Salon, maintains the list. The priority on the waiting list is determined strictly by the date and time when the application was received by the SECRETARY, except that if a member wishes to nominate a spouse or adult child for membership this can be done at any time whether the waiting list is open or not and they will go to the head of the queue (unless another member has already done so in which case they will be second on the queue).

Each time a member wants to sell their debenture, they advise our secretary, who passes the request on to Mike. Mike then advises all persons on the list of the availability of the debenture and that they must offer to purchase and pay for that debenture within 21 days. The person highest on the list who makes the required offer then has that offer accepted by Mike on behalf of the seller. Any person on the list who does not offer to purchase as required, is taken off the list.

In order to keep Mike's work load at reasonable levels, the waiting list is limited to about 15 persons. When the waiting list is closed, any applications to join it are kept in date of receipt order and added to the list when it is re-opened. Claudia Bartsch sold her debenture last month. At that time 3 persons on the waiting list did not offer to purchase so that made a reduction of 4 off the list.

Norman Upton is our new member so please make him welcome if you meet up with him.

### **HISTORY**

The last report got to the AGM 1982. At that meeting, our president Mike Salon (pictured below), distributed working papers for lodge development and construction. This showed the things to be done and was fairly close to the result.

At this stage a team had selected the preferred site but we had to negotiate with the National Park. The Park delays put the program back one year.

You will note that the first item was a circular to members to ensure they could all be involved in the early planning and selection of the type of lodge we would build. I remember that my suggestions for a high R number (insulation rating) involving a small number of small windows were not preferred by most – (we got plenty of big windows) – at least my views had been presented and considered – I was involved. Many suggestiond were rejected, but many were accepted.

September 1982 - Select small panel of potential architects and commission each to produce several preliminary designs and cost estimates.

November 1982 - Receive above from architects.

Assuming Lease Negotiations Completed December 1982 - Apply for D.A. from relevant authorities (N.P.W.S. & Council)

Club selects final design and architect.
Contract with architect to produce working drawings.

March 1983 - 1, Above finalised by architect.

2. Apply for B.A. from relevant authorities (N.P.W,S. & Council)

April 1983 - Appointment of, and-finalise working arrangement with Builder.

Winter 1983 - Finalise labour commitmeints and materials schedule for Stage 1 construction.

October 1983 - Stage 1 Construction

May 1984 - Sitework, Footings, Foundations, Brickwork, Concrete Slabs etc. up to completion of Basement, Sewerage and Drainage.

Winter 1984 - Finalise detailed timetable, labour conanitments and materials schedule for Stage 2 Construction.

October 1984 - Stage 2 Construction.

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May 1985 - Framework, Wall Cladding and Roofing, Windows and Doors, Internal Lining and Insulation, Electrical - Plumbing and Heating System Installations, Internal Joining, Painting, Finishing & Furnishing.

Construction to take Place over 2 summers, 83/84 & 84/85

Above will be permitted by N,P.W.S. Architect not required for supervision.
