Those of us who have stayed at Illabunda know well the blissful feeling of taking off the ski boots and sitting comfortably in the best restaurant in the snow - Illabunda. At lunch time a good rest in pleasant uncrowded surroundings with a cold drink, beautiful view and a tasty and copious meal is just what is required - and what isn't really available anywhere else in Perisher Valley.

Little wonder that people take advantage of such a good thing, especially when the cost is the princely sum of \$5. There are two issues that arise. First, Paul and Kim our past managers advised that the cost of providing the lunches far exceeds \$5. Your Committee has consequently increased the charge to \$10 per lunch per visitor, payable to the Managers that same day by the guest who extended the invitation.

The other issue is that our Club rules for mealtime visitors are not being followed. Some members and others who happen to be at Perisher but are not Lodge guests tend to just turn up for lunch. This is not acceptable, particularly as it sometimes occurs on changeover days when there are often two lots of guests already. Arriving and departing guests share the dining room which can become somewhat congested.

In future the correct procedure must be followed. The Managers' agreement must be secured before any visitors for meals are invited and only those invited by current guests will be accepted.

1999 AGM

The minutes of the 1999 Annual General Meeting are not out yet, so here is a report of some of the things that happened and were said.

President Simon Smart was living it up at a swank resort so John Dengate presented his report which summarized the bad season, low utilization (73%, which was better than most of Perisher), yet we still achieved a reasonable financial result no doubt due to our excellent facilities and service from our managers Kim and Paul. The new Kitchen, dining room, drying room and shower hot water changes all worked well.

This year we had a lot less hectic maintenance program, the main job has been double-glazing in rooms 1, 2, 3 and 5, with more room in room 2, and some general maintenance.

Simon expressed regret that our involvement in the annual ball was canceled this year due to lack of interest.

Simon then thanked all those many people who have helped with the club maintenance and operations this year.

Treasurer John Henry advised there was a loss of \$4,764 on trading that increased to \$16,872 after inclusion of depreciation and amortization which was reasonable after bookings were down \$10,500 on budget. Most costs were consistent with budget although electricity was up due to higher thermostat settings in some areas and the larger drying room. Also part of the 1997 NPWS community service fee was delayed and included in 1998 expense. Based on the account for the first 6 months of 1999, the annualized cost will now be at least \$10,300 per annum, (41% increase over 3 years).

Investments of \$106,587 held at year-end are considered adequate. The committee has approved a break even trading budget for 1999, excluding depreciation and amortization.

Club Captain Graeme Williams reported that in some of the worst snow conditions on record both our training and race weekends were well attended and good results were achieved by both Junior and Senior race teams. For every new snowfall, we had the equivalent in follow up rain, with snow, rain, mud and rocks.

The two Junior Training weekends were lucky in that we found just enough snow between the rocks and both downhill and cross-country skills were instructed. The junior interclub was run in disgusting conditions, rain, fog and very wet snow. As reward for their efforts our X-Country team finished first, Renee Bartsch, Liam Zeller and Chris Bilboe. We also had the youngest competitor finish. Thomas Williams (6 years old). Our Downhill team was placed fourth. A great effort from all in the conditions. The Junior X-Country Champions are Renee Bartsch and Jai Restante and Downhill Champions are Renee Bartsch and Liam Zeller (10 vears old). Other team members were Jacinta Bartsch, Ben Zeller, Sian Bilboe, Jonathan Williams and Ben Restante. Thanks to assisting members Friedel Bartsch, Lucus Molloy and Helmut Zeller for their assistance.

Senior Downhill training at Blue Cow proved to be just what the team needed for the Interclub Race as in torrential rain and lightning the team achieved an inspiring first place. The X-Country team came in second , with a solid first place from Friedel Bartsch, to regain the Combined Interclub Trophy. The team comprised of Ben Salon, Friedel Bartsch, Michael Livermore, Graeme Williams, Tod Fairbrother and Justin Tierney.

Club Champion was Ben Salon ,X-Country Champion was Friedel Bartsch and Downhill Champion was Ben Salon.

The Perisher Cup was cancelled due to lack of snow and our Veteran X-Country skiers were unable to race due to sickness and extremely bad weather.

Thank you to all the members who assisted during the year and our lodge managers who are always obliging and supportive

Your new committee for 1999-2000 is the same as last year with the exception that after many years in your service, John Henry retired as treasurer and Darren Morris was elected to take his place.

HISTORY

In the last newsletter I showed the March 1982 provisional timetable for the new lodge lease, design and construction. Because of NPWS delays, the whole program started one year later, and all events then occurred as planned, plus one year. i.e. the stage 1 construction occurred from Oct 84 to May 85 and stage 2 to completion from Oct 85 to May 86.

The main organization involved the club board retaining overall control of the project including leases, raising of funds, approval of forward plans and budgets, and continual control of fund releases during construction, but the board appointed a construction sub-committee responsible (to the board), for the lodge design, selection and control of the builder and expenditures to completion of construction

In Sept 1982 the building sub-committee was appointed comprising Adrian Bell (Chairman), W. Kelly, J. Henry, C. Ellen, and E. Fairbrother. This committee first met on 19/10/82 and invited Ross Livermore to join them at their next meeting as the

prospective builder. I think they met once or more a month from then until lodge completion. They were also involved in numerous other meetings with the club board, architects, suppliers, NPWS etc. The final result was very dependent on their enormous (sometimes frantic), workload over the next 3.5 years. - To be continued.
